

Caribbean Basic Safety Training

Safety, health, and well-being are becoming increasingly important topics within each organization in the Caribbean. According to legislation and regulations, the responsibility for these topics lies with both the employee and the employer. This is why employees should receive training and information about *inter alia* risks in the workplace. In addition, many companies stipulate that their own employees and subcontractors who carry out work on their premises should participate in person-related training.

Objective

The objective of the **Caribbean Basic Safety Training** is to influence the behavior of employees and to teach them which safety requirements and regulations they should observe when carrying out their work.

Target group

The training focuses on all employees (active in the workplace) of companies that carry out high-risk work. This training is often mandatory at a **Caribbean Safety Standard certified** company.

Duration & Costs

The training course is one full day and costs \$175, -- per person. This with a minimum of ten students. The maximum occupancy is fifteen students. The costs exclude refreshments, drinks, lunch and training location.

The training is valid for three years and will be registered with the Caribbean Health & Safety Foundation.
